David Owen Hastings / Lecture / "Minimal Design: Maximal Input"

The modern quilting movement is evolving and changing, but one thing remains consistent: simple, spare design combined with thoughtful quilting make an outstanding combination.

This talk gives an overview of my process for coming up with simple graphic quilt designs, starting with stitched paper models (called maquettes). I show examples of how to translate an architectural photo into a quilt design and have many samples of mini quilts I created using this process. The techniques I present are also great for making unique modern quilt block designs. I also talk about walking foot quilting and how to break free from stitch in the ditch.


"Needles, Threads, and Tension / How They Interact"

This is the original Charlton Sewing Center talk — literally thousands of people have heard it, and I still book it many times a year. This is a great presentation because it is fun! I'll bring two posters, a giant needle, three dowels, a paper plate, and the famous "stitch" from Home Depot.

For approximately an hour, you will have many moments I call the "V8 Moments," when something that seemed complicated becomes very clear.

The lecture includes a six-page handout with illustrations and information that is timeless and can be referred to often. I can also provide Schmetz needle charts that are a great resource.
