BUSINESS MEETING

Sally Wright's improvements to our guild's tech organization: Kudos to Sally, who has spent many hours drawing together all the member lists, emailing lists, account passwords and other information from various sources into a single Google Drive account associated with our guild email address. This will allow:

- Emailing from our guild Gmail account rather than from the personal accounts of various officers, and
- Smoother transitions from one year's officers to the next as all our information will finally be in one location.

Sherri Lynn Wood's online Improv Layered Curve workshop May 23rd

- Our guild's co-sponsorship of the workshop does not involve any guild funds; we need only publicize it.
- Current guild members are entitled to a 10% discount on the registration fee for the promo code see the flier mailed to members last week.

Question: Should we pay our members for the programs they present at our meetings?

- Some other guilds do, but thus far we have not done so.
 - Our members have generously donated their time to provide most of our meeting programs.
 - Paying them will acknowledge that as artists and creators we should be remunerated for our work.
 - Program presenters may choose to donate their fees back to the guild, but it should absolutely not be expected that they do so.
- We will defer voting on this issue until the June 7th meeting per our bylaws, a majority of those present at the meeting will determine the outcome.
- Julie provided us with this fee schedule example from the Hands Across the Valley Guild:
 - A. Short (15-20 minute) presentation at Sunday meeting (i.e. as part of a panel): \$30
 - B. Solo prepared, organized presentation at Sunday meeting with or without Trunk Show or Power Point: \$150
 - C. Half-day Workshop Leader (including lunch): \$200
 - D. Full-day Workshop Leader (including lunch): \$300

or

E. One Hourly Rate to encompass all of the above, with the exception of A. above.

NOTE: These rates apply unless presenter has other, published rates.

- As financial background for this proposal Treasurer Barbara Farrell noted that last year our income was around \$2,200 and our expenses \$2,400, but the expenses included \$1,500 for the Melissa Averinos workshop, so adopting the HATV fee schedule would be within our means.
- If we vote to pay our members who present programs for us, we will also need to decide whether to make this retroactive to the beginning of 2020.

- Stiletto (lots of different ones on the market) for guiding fabric under the foot of your sewing machine & close to needle without endangering fingers – especially great for
 - curved piecing
 - preventing pleats and wrinkles
 - o preventing fabric from shifting at the end of a seam

- Stiletto Donna's son makes wooden handles for stilettos and for seam rippers!
- Steam-a-Seam 2 Double Stick Fusible Tape: for attaching binding before sewing for better hold than with pins or clips, comes in different widths – available at online fabric stores.

- Add-A-Quarter rulers, 6" and 12", invaluable for adding the quarter-inch seam allowance for paper piecing available at online fabric stores.
- Cosmetic brush for cleaning sewing machine innards.

- Magic Pins with an elongated head that is easier to grasp and grip: https://www.connectingthreads.com/magic-pins/g/MagicPins
- Kids watercolor paint brush for cleaning sewing machine.
- Tip: Sewing together two rows when one is slightly longer than the other: put the longer one on the bottom.
- Tip: When sewing together a quilt top made of small squares, try sewing them into 9-patch units instead of first sewing them into rows & then sewing the rows together.
