2. Motion made by Sally Wright and seconded by Barbara Stroup: That for calendar year 2020 we allocate up to \$500 to be spent on a workshop or workshops by an outside presenter or by one of our members, with any additional cost of the workshop paid for by registration fees.

Both motions passed in accordance with our bylaws by a majority of the members at the meeting.

Treasurer's Report

Starting Balances May 29, 2020: Bank \$4,237.41 and Petty Cash \$6.73. No income in June, but two small expenses: \$2.50 for stamps to mail guild pins to members who have requested them and a \$3.00 bank analysis fee. Ending balances as of July 4, 2020: Bank \$4,234.41 and Petty Cash \$4.23.


Or, if you have a current project that is driving you crazy, email a photo and from the collective wisdom of the other guild members, a solution for your problem may arise!



Fabric Postcard Challenge – Summer 2020

Who doesn't like to get mail? Especially in this time of social distancing...

Modern Quilter (and NASA engineer!) Sarah of saroy.net has this year challenged herself to <u>100</u> <u>Days of Fabric Postcards</u>, but we are challenging you to make just one.



Here's how to participate:

- ASAP (by 7/13?) email Betty MacLeod at <u>MacLeod5@aol.com</u> and include your mailing address so she can pair you up with someone else participating in the swap.
- Create a 4"x 6" quilted fabric postcard. You'll find lots of tutorials online including:
 - Sarah's Fabric Postcard Tutorial
 - o Sprucecraft's 7 Ways to Make Easy Fabric Postcards
 - Jessi on the Go's on YouTube Simple Fabric Postcard Tutorial
 - o Rob Appell of Man Sewings' Fabric Postcards: Easy Sewing Tutorial
- Use materials you have on hand.
 - o No need to spend money.
 - Challenge your resourcefulness!
- Try a new technique! Not necessary, but a great opportunity.
- Mail the postcard to your partner by Saturday, September 5th so recipients can share them during our Zoom meeting on Sunday, September 13th (one weekend later than usual because of the Labor Day weekend).
 - o Mail it by itself:
 - Make sure it's a bit flexible (like a regular postcard) for USPS sorting machines.
 - Take it to the post office where you will need to pay extra postage for hand canceling.
 - o Or mail it in an envelope *essential* if you add beads, buttons, etc.
